
The Mission of the Center for International Experience

We are committed to **ASSISTING** all undergraduates to **PLAN** significant, productive, and rewarding experience abroad, and to find ways of **FINANCING** these activities. The Center offers all students an integrated process for learning about **STUDY, SERVICE, INTERNSHIPS, EMPLOYMENT** and **RESEARCH** abroad. Staff work together to provide excellent **SUPPORT** so that each student's international experience will be worthwhile in every way.

This year we have consolidated many of the gains we made in our first years of operation, both in terms of developing collaborative strategies for advising students about all opportunities, and in terms of using on-line applications and web-based materials to make international experience accessible to all students. We recognize that many students of this generation choose to find most of their information on the internet, and prefer to meet with advisers on an individual basis once they have a clear sense of what they wish to discuss. For us, this means rethinking the traditional pattern of information sessions and other events, and developing new tools and strategies for working effectively with students.

Activities in 2009-10

The Center for International Experience was established in spring 2008, and we now have two full years of working within this structure. This year has been one in which we have:

- ✿ increased participation to a total of 1317 individual students in 2009-10, and to 73% of the class of 2010
 - ✿ improved processes for managing applications, using the technologies to make study abroad and internship applications easier for students and for their faculty and advisers
 - ✿ published new on-line pre-departure orientation materials, including important information for student-led international travel
 - ✿ implemented an assessment program for experience abroad which is already yielding information that is helping us improve our advising and program management
 - ✿ strengthened our network of advisers, examining our mission and beginning a process that helps students use critical reflection to deepen their experience abroad
 - ✿ launched successful new summer programs in Amman, Jordan and in Mumbai, India
 - ✿ developed a new process that allows international alumni and affiliates such as World Fellows to post internship opportunities for Yale students
 - ✿ worked with students to bring our college-based peer advising program to a new level of effectiveness
 - ✿ intensified our efforts to 'green' CIE office operations, our marketing and promotional efforts, and to raise awareness among undergraduate students planning to go abroad about sustainability as a factor in their decision-making
 - ✿ assisted in the establishment of a new program for Global Health Fellows which will provide mentoring, academic guidance, and practical experience for students interested in global health

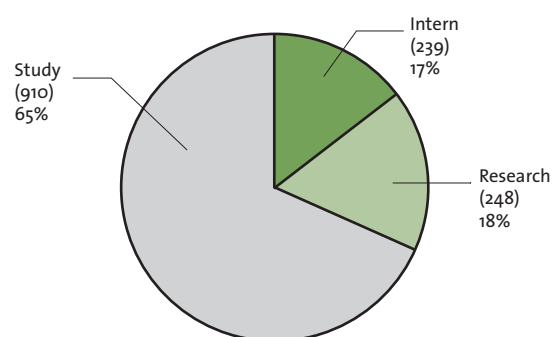

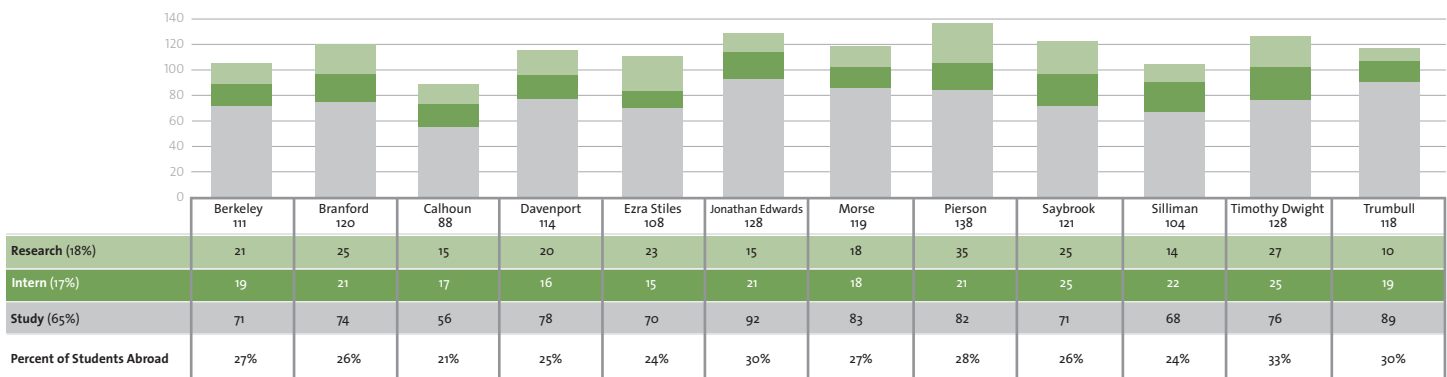

International Experiences by Residential College and Type of Activity, 2009-10

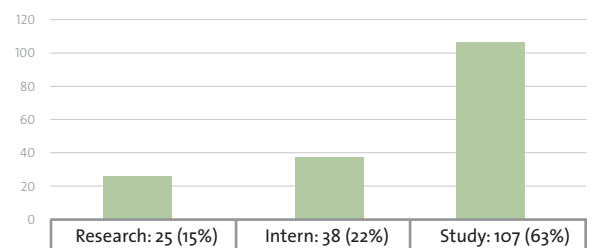


International Student Experiences Abroad

We are delighted to note that international students are over-represented among students seeking international experiences. There are 467 international students in Yale College, representing 9% of the undergraduate population. In 2009-10, these students participated in 170 international experiences (12% of all international experiences), meaning that 36% of international students are undertaking an experience in a third country.

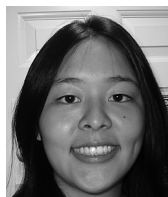

Study Abroad

Study abroad during the academic year has not grown in the same way that summer participation has grown. This is an anticipated result of building a very large and substantial portfolio of summer programs: students are able to have what they see as the great benefit of four full years at Yale in combination with substantial experiences abroad during the summer. Nonetheless, we believe that for some students the duration and integration possible with a semester or year abroad has very significant benefits and we encourage students to consider this option whenever possible, and are working with faculty to identify and develop programs targeting specific majors, which will increase the perceived viability of academic year study abroad.

Participation in non-Yale summer programs abroad continues to grow, as does the number of courses available through Yale Summer Session Abroad. In 2010-11, as part of the review process for the Curriculum for Yale College initiatives, a faculty committee will examine study abroad for Yale undergraduates holistically, and we look forward to working with our colleagues to recalibrate any processes that are found to need improvement.

Yale Summer Session

Yale Summer Session continues to grow and to serve the extremely important function of allowing students to study abroad with the mentorship and guidance of Yale faculty in a broad range of fields. In 2010 we added a program for second year Arabic language study in Jordan; and a program for students interested in India, focusing on film studies and linguistics in Mumbai.

Through the International Alliance of Research Universities Global Summer Program, courses are offered at Yale and nine sister institutions in eight countries which bring together students from all our universities to study and learn together in the classroom and from each other. Yale Summer Session offers in New Haven a course entitled Topics in International Economics which is very successful and enrolled 16 students from eight partner institutions in 2010.

Language study and study abroad

We believe that language study is a very significant element in the development of intercultural literacy, and try to provide effective support for all students who seek an immersion experience as part of their language study at Yale. We are fortunate in the existence of programs run by Yale's Center for Language Study that allow students to further their language acquisition through guided work on an individual basis. The Fields program supports advanced study of a language for academic purposes; and the DILS (Directed Independent Language Study) program provides an opportunity for students to study languages not offered through traditional classroom instruction at Yale, and is based on a structured relationship among the student, a native-speaker Language Partner, appropriate instructional materials, and an outside examiner. At the CIE we work with students to find opportunities abroad that will help them with their goals for language acquisition, examining with them the curricular and local cultural elements provided by programs in different countries. Numbers of Yale students choose to pursue intensive language study over the summer. For Asian languages, the Richard U. Light Fellowship Program is an extraordinary resource, and students also use international summer awards and other fellowships for this purpose.

Because we take very seriously the significance of learning to communicate in a foreign language as an essential element in the development of intercultural competence, we try to monitor carefully the needs of students interested in the less commonly taught languages. Yale is fortunate in having a strong independent language program through the Center for Language Study. While it would clearly be advantageous to give credit for such study, even without this incentive Yale students show considerable commitment to independent language study.

The FIELDS program at the Center for Language Study

The Fields program gives students the opportunity to pursue advanced-level language study within the context of an academic area of focus. Through a combination of mechanisms including work with a language partner, mentoring by faculty in the target academic discipline, field experience abroad in a work or study program, and coursework on campus where available, students rapidly build proficiency and are assessed through oral proficiency testing and the creation of an e-portfolio.

Internships

Internships abroad are available both through the International Bulldogs and other sponsored programs, which provided opportunities for 150 students in 2010. Students also identify their own opportunities and seek merit-based funding for them. We have a new plan for assessment of the learning that takes place through these programs. We have also created new web-based tools to utilize Yale's networks as effectively as possible to connect alumni and associates who offer internship placements with students who can benefit from this great resource.

In response to Yale College's strategic initiative to encourage our students to pursue public service, we are reviewing and developing new sources of information and opportunities in this area. In 2010-11 we will also review our work with students interested in the arts, and with the help of the new Associate Dean for the Arts, we hope to create synergies and work with faculty to develop new opportunities for students majoring in or practicing the arts.

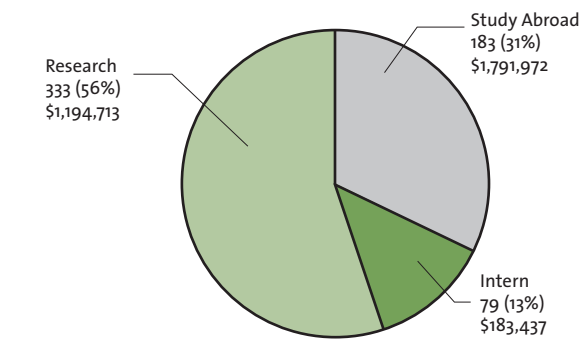

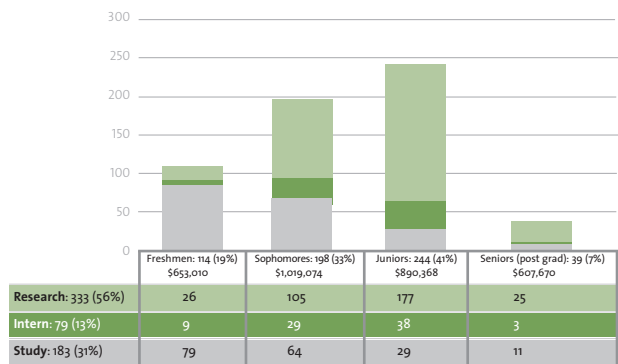
Fellowship awards by Type of Activity, 2009-2010

Total = 595; \$3,170,122



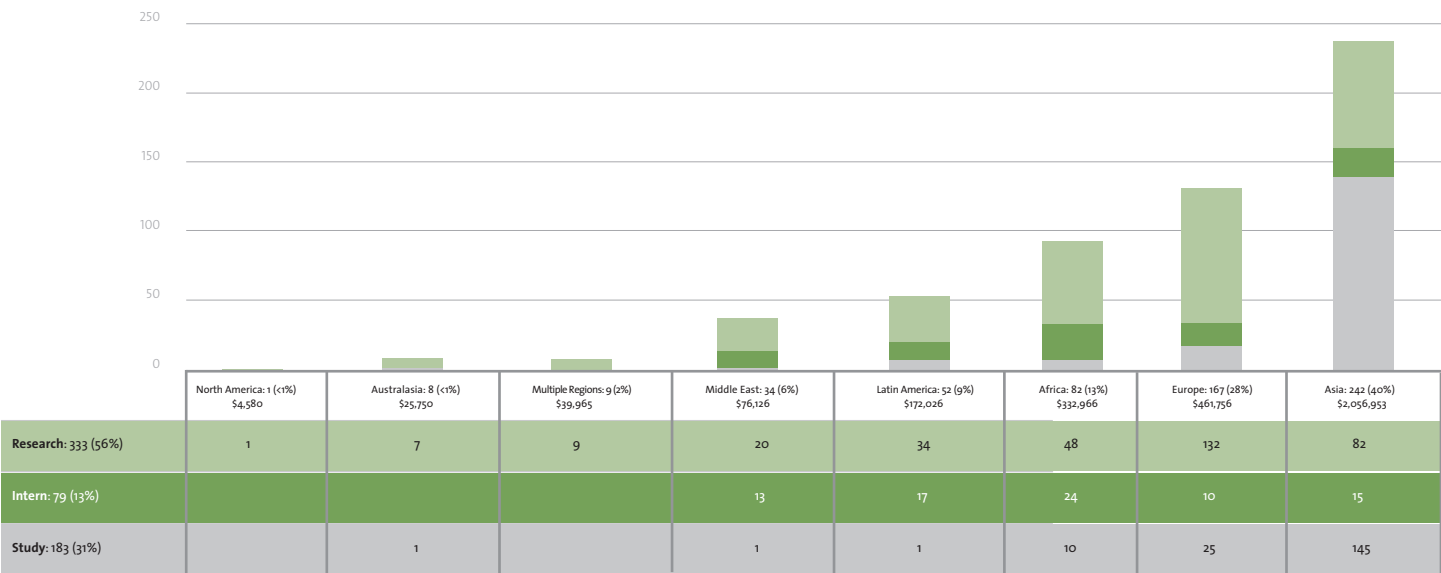
Fellowship awards by Class Year and Type of Activity, 2009-2010

International Summer Award

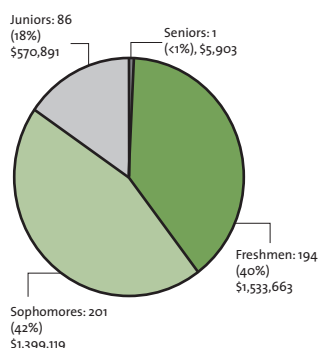

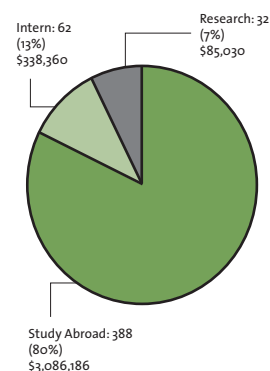
2010 International Summer Awards by Class Year

ISA funding and need

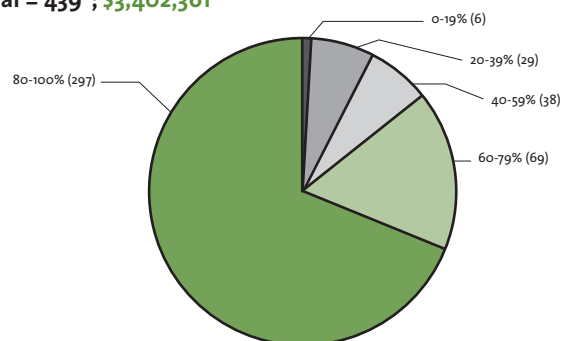

Conclusion

We urge the reader to spend some time reviewing the materials available on the Center for International Experience website. As our students depend increasingly on the internet for information, we work to improve the quality of the information we provide, the checklists and other tools we make available, and the articles and the resources we flag for their use. Increasingly our students file reports and commentaries on their experiences as blogs, and we know that other students find this mode of communication very useful. In the coming year we plan to review our patterns of communication with our students to be sure that we are using the technologies as effectively as possible. At the same time, we are intensively involved in the work of guiding students towards ownership of their own educational experience and to the development of all the intellectual and emotional skills necessary for engagement with other cultures in sustainable and reciprocal ways. We are actively examining our own advising and the learning of our students so that we can achieve this goal.

At Yale, as at many of our sister institutions this has been a challenging year, as we have seen new cuts in our budgets and lost additional staff positions. Good teamwork has become even more important as we grapple with these realities with the intention of maintaining the standards we have established for our work, and indeed always aiming to improve what we do. We are particularly grateful for the support and engagement of so many wonderful students returned from experience abroad, without whom our outreach activities would be feeble indeed. We also very much value colleagues beyond the CIE: we could not do our work without the support of faculty, residential college deans, our colleagues in the MacMillan Center and the Office of International Students and Scholars – as well as, less obviously, many offices such as health services, risk management, the Office of General Counsel, Development – to name only a few. The seriousness with which the President’s mandate for international experience is taken across the campus is demonstrated by the cheerful collaboration we are lucky enough to enjoy.

“My experience abroad made me more independent, more mature, and more confident... I realize that I have an entire new bank of knowledge and experience from which to draw... I am able to more critically analyze my priorities as well as the direction I would like my life to take. I find it extremely valuable to have such a clear understanding of another culture – I am now cognizant of the fact that there is no ‘right way’ to do things. As I finish my undergraduate education and go on to pursue employment and, eventually, graduate school, I know I will continually draw upon my experiences in Denmark and all that they taught me as a source of guidance and direction.”
